St. Edwards Lodge No: 966 donate £2,000 to Leek Dementia Charity

St. Edwards Lodge who meet in Leek have donated £2,000 to the charity Approach Dementia Support, to assist with funding to set up a Dementia Support Garden in Leek on a previously unused grassed area at St. Edwards Middle School. The presentation took place on Monday 11th July 2022.



The project which needs to raise £12,000 will make a huge difference to the quality of life of those living with dementia and their loved ones. Gardening builds strength improves balance and can help to reduce stress and anxiety. For those living with dementia there are added benefits such as maintaining cognitive function and providing social interaction, helping people to remain stimulated, feel valued and helpful. The garden will be supervised by school staff and skilled support workers. Children from the school will be able to meet and work with the visitors in the garden, growing flowers, fruit and vegetables.

It is planned to grow a lot of fresh edible organic produce and once harvested much will be donated to a local foodbank providing a vital lifeline for many families and older people in the area who struggle to afford sufficient healthy food.

W. Bro. Selwyn Burton from St. Edwards lodge said, 'It is a pleasure to be able to

support such a worthwhile cause that will help the well-being of local people'. Staffordshire Freemasons donation to SSAFA

Saturday 26th June 2022 saw 150 Freemasons, their wives, partners and friends gather at the County Showground, Stafford for a Midsummer Ball.

The representatives of the SSAFA were clearly delighted and Colin Critchlow thanked the everyone for the generous donation. During the evening a further £3,375 was raised towards Staffordshire 2024 Charity Festival.

SSAFA is a tri-service charity who support members of the Armed forces and their families through whatever difficulties they are facing for as long as it takes.

Aldridge to Arezzo 2022

In August 2019 I reported that how good friends and keen cyclists, Bro's Richard Archer and Mark Duce of Streetly Lodge No: 7448 at Aldridge had set off one early morning in May 2019 from Aldridge and cycled to Cavriglia, Arezzo, Italy.

They cycled the entire route apart from having to use the ferry to cross the English Channel and Lake Lucerne and raised nearly £3,000 for the 2024 Festival. Well, the intrepid pair couldn't sit still for long and here, is their latest cycling log.



The trip started



at 9.00 am on Wednesday 25th May after a bacon sandwich with the P.G.D.C. W. Bro Jeremy Roberts there to make sure we left and who wouldn't go without an electric bike! Well, the first day was a steady 64 miles on our Dawes Touring bikes loaded with tents, camping equipment and clothing for the 3-week ride, through the Cotswolds to our camp site in Cirencester. Day 2 was also steady with regards to miles covered, but some serious climbing and I must admit some pushing of the bikes up the steeper hills. An acknowledgment that 3 years older since the last trip to Italy and not enough training may be part of the problem. Again, another night camping, but this time on a wild farm where we shared a field with Alpaca's and a single composting loo! Day 3 was quite short, iust 47 miles to Portsmouth where we arrived in good time to have a couple of rehydrating beers and a carb

loading doner kebab before boarding the

ferry to Santander. It is important to remember that as elite athletes we must stay fuelled and hydrated.

After 2 nights and a day on the ferry we arrived in Santander on a beautiful sunny Sunday morning and then, the proper cycling started. After 62 miles and 4,800 ft of climbing we stopped just short of Bilboa, but with no camp sites available, booked into a small hotel. After a decent night's sleep and a good breakfast and plenty of strong coffee we set off for what turned out to be a very tough day, which is not actually supported by the stats. Only 36 miles covered, and a mere 3,000 ft climbed, but the heat was intense and while the hills were short, they were incredibly steep. Again, a fair bit of pushing. We called an early end to the day and again booked into a small B&B. This is when the problems started. After a short walk we stopped at a bar for refreshments, when Richard went into AF. A heart condition which led to him taking up cycling 7 years ago and for which he





After 6 days cycling, 5 nights camping, and we had made it from coast to coast. A steady day, into a strong head wind along the coast. The following day was a big day covering 83 miles into the heart of Provence, which meant just one thing. We had to celebrate with a glass or two of Rose'.

The next morning, we woke up to see the trees bending over double in the wind,



has had an operation to cure. A night on medication and still not feeling great we decided to catch the train to San Sebastian. It turns out that Richard's condition was brought on by caffeine, so no more coffee for him.

After a steady day the journey continued, only 13 miles to the French border and into France without a problem, past Biarritz and Bayonne before stopping at a small farm where we pitched the tents for the night. The next few days followed the same pattern. Approximately 60 miles a day in hot weather, camping each night, when the heavens would open. Packing a wet tent is not fun, but much better than cycling in the rain. The 'cycling gods' were certainly keeping an eye on us, as by now we were getting fitter and the days were getting longer, 71 miles into Carcassonne, and another 66 miles before we reached the Mediterranean.



thankfully the wind was mostly behind us and not in our faces. We covered 58 miles but had to end the day early because the winds became so strong that it was dangerous to cycle on the main roads, we were on at the time. A nice little hotel in the town of Draguagnan, a few beers with the locals, a nice meal with a bottle of wine and then a night cap listening to rock music in the local square. A good end to an exciting day.



Next morning Richard had a flat tyre, so after a change of inner tube a late start. A steep climb out of town before settling into the days ride. We must be getting fitter as we both managed to cycle up the hills, without the need to push, 55 miles, 3,700 ft of climbing and we arrive on the Cote Du Azure, where we book into a little camp site. Pitch the tents, a quick swim and then to the camp site restaurant. Our French isn't great and their English, not much better, but we managed to order something along with what turned out to be the largest carafe of wine we have ever seen. Cheap, yes, good, no, but despite the fact that the red juice took the enamel off our teeth, we still managed most of it!

The next day saw us cycle through Nice, past Monaco, over the Italian border, through San Remo and on to Imperia. A total of 58 miles, which after an initial climb

of some 2,500 ft, after Nice was all along the coast. An amazing day cycling and 18 days after setting off we had made it to Italy. Another night, another camp site, which turned out to be the last time we camped. A quick swim in the sea before heading into town to find a nice little Italian bar. A few beers, and some aperitifs, because that's what you do in Italy, and then a nice meal with lots of pasta and some nice



wine, followed by a good night's sleep.

The next morning saw Mark having a fight with his tent which didn't want to be put away, much to the amusement of Richard, before we set off for another iconic day of cycling along the sea front. 64 miles before stopping at Arenzano, not far from Genova. A bright early start saw us cycling along the coast to Genova for rush hour. Quite exciting and a loaded Dawes, but what a nice city. Most definitely worth a longer visit next time. Then life got hard. We headed inland and the cool sea breeze was no longer keeping

us cool. Temperatures of 33 degrees at 9.00 am and 38 degrees in the afternoon, are not fun cycling up some of the steeper hills we were now encountering. A day of 60 miles and nearly 5,000 ft of climbing before stopping at a hotel in the middle of nowhere, but with spectacular views. The hotel was quite basic, with no aircon and shared bathroom facilities, but as is often the case a great restaurant. We had a very nice meal, but to this day, we are not sure that the



third bottle of wine with the meal was the best decision we made on the trip, even though it felt so at the time.

After a light breakfast we set off down the mountain, when Richard suddenly had to stop as the front wheel of his bike for some reason had come lose. Quite an exciting moment!!! Back down to the coast, through La Spezia and some wonderful flat coastal cvcling before heading back in land to the wonderful walled city of Lucca. A total of 68 miles with just 2,100 ft of climbing. A

nice easy day apart from the intense heat, which started to take its toll, particularly on Mark. A lovely evening soaking up the atmosphere of Lucca and a wonderful meal before a terrible night's sleep due to the high temperature in the room which had inadequate aircon.

The next day was due to be our final day, but with the sun at its highest hitting 40 degrees and no cool breeze to help, Mark, suffered and after just 45 miles and 1,800 ft of climbing we had to book into a B&B, where after a cold shower Mark collapsed on the bed. Richard did the only sensible thing and left him to it while he went out and found a bar and a nice little trattoria.

The shower and early night did the job, and after an early breakfast, watching the hot air

balloons glide by, we set off for our final destination. A mere 32 miles, 3,333 ft of climbing and we were there. Arrived at Cavriglia, Arezzo at 11.15 after a total distance of 1,199 miles with 53,450 ft of climbing in 21 days of cycling, during which we had one episode of caffeine induced AF and one case of heat exhaustion, one puncture and one lose wheel.

But what a great trip, which way next ?
