Masonic support... My Story by W. Bro Mark Sewell, ProvJGW Elect

I'm sure Brethren often ask about the Masonic Charitable Foundation and how it assists the Brethren of our Province and their families. Well, this is my story, and I can't thank everybody involved and emphasise enough how they have helped and looked after me.

I am the secretary of Castellum Lodge No: 6710 who meet at Newcastle, but I began my masonic journey when I was initiated into Birchwood Lodge 5178 in the Province of Hertfordshire in 2006. I did not know much about Freemasonry, or the work carried out around the globe and at first, I even thought that the lodge I joined was the only one! But, soon after I learned that I had thousands of Brothers around the world, all of a similar mind set. I later moved to Staffordshire with my family to run my own transport Company and continued my masonic journey.

My story with the Masonic Charitable Foundation starts in July 2011, when I was racing my Honda motorcycle at Mallory Park and my brakes failed. As a result of the accident, I received several serious injuries including damage to my spine and I spent several months in hospital, then back home lying on a bed with nothing but a ceiling to look at.

I really was at the lowest point in my life, both mentally and physically. I had lost all income from the three companies I owned and my world and that of my family was literally turned upside down. I had lost the will to carry on. My injuries meant that I would be confined to a wheelchair for the rest of my life, leaving my children to grow up without the physical support that a father gives and my wife as my permanent carer.

Whilst lying in a hospital bed I was handed a masonic magazine by my lovely wife as she had to leave for work. As I opened it, this small business size card fell out. It was the Masonic Samaritan Card with a phone number. I spent the next half hour just holding the card, thinking do I call or not? Luckily, I chose to call, as I was thinking this was my last chance and it could not harm by calling.



From this moment on my situation changed for ever, and I was visited within hours by the Staffordshire Provincial Grand Almoner W. Bro Alan Walker. He made sure I was both mentally and physically looked after. I did not have to worry any more about my wellbeing, but much more importantly the wellbeing of my family. We often forget the trauma they have to suffer.

For eight years my Lodge Almoner and the Provincial Almoner were both there for me; guiding me through the application process and supporting me with the MCF. It was only through their help and advice, I was able to continue with my life, albeit swapping my motorcycle for a wheelchair for a while.

But, now I am able to stand and walk due to a fantastic but, now everyday, procedure. This has left my wheelchair empty, but please believe me, if it was not for Freemasonry my wheelchair could have been empty for a much different reason. I really was at my lowest ebb of poverty and distress.

The money we give towards the Festival does not disappear into a black hole somewhere. I can speak from experience Brethren it comes back tenfold, whether it is towards charities in the Province or for Brethren like me. Please support the 2024 Festival as much as you can.

The Masonic Charitable Foundation

What is the Masonic Charitable Foundation? The Masonic Chaiitable Foundation (MCF) builds better lives by enabling opportunity, advancing healthcare and education and promoting independence for Freemasons, their families and the wider community. The MCF is one of the largest grantmaking charities in the country supporting Freemasons and their families as well as charities across England and Wales.

Financial

The financial grants help Masonic families who are unable to afford everyday living costs and to actively participate in their community.

Health

The grants help Masonic families get the treatment, care or support they need to live healthy and independent lives.

Family

The grants help Masonic families by providing opportunities for young people and a range of high-quality care provision.

Those seeking support must be a Freemason or have a strong family connection to a Freemason. A Freemason is someone who is or was a member of a Lodge regulated by the United Grand Lodge of England. This includes Freemasons in England, Wales, the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man as well as members of overseas Lodges which follow the English Constitution.

We define a strong family connection as a Freemason's:

- married or life partner
- widow or surviving partner; divorced or separated partner;
- child (under 25) in full-time education

Other relations may also qualify for support if they can demonstrate that a Freemason has provided them with significant financial or physical support.


What we are extremely bad at is accepting help especially financial help. It seems to be that we give freely but can't receive.

CLARENDON LODGE No. 8023 and "Race Against Blood Cancer"

In January a group of Wolves fans having raised almost £2,000 in support of former Wolverhampton Wanderers club goalkeeper Carl Ikeme and the Race Against Blood Cancer charity presented a cheque to him at the Molineux stadium.

Members of the Wolves fan volunteer group had held a quiz night to raise money for the charity which aims to help people with the condition.

They wanted to support the ex-footballer, who made over 200 first team appearances for the club, as he was diagnosed with leukaemia back in 2017 which he recovered from and went into remission in 2018.

OMNIUM - "For All"

All of us are aware of the importance and value of the Universities Scheme. Since its formation in 2005, it has enabled many hundreds of young men from Universities across England and Wales to experience what had been available at Oxford and Cambridge since the 19th century. At least 87 Lodges and Chapters are in the Scheme.

It struck two Cheshire brethren - Mike Steggles and Paul Crudge - that for all the obvious success of the Scheme, there was a curious gap: there was no Lodge specifically for the Open University. Mike and Paul decided to put that right. The result was the formation, within the Universities Scheme, of Omnium Lodge, No. 10005. It is a Lodge specifically for those with Open University connections. The Open University was founded in 1969 and has helped 2 million students realise their ambitions. Such student numbers means that there will likely be many hundreds within England and Wales for whom Omnium Lodge would be a natural 'fit'.

A Lodge must be based somewhere and, as the brainchild of two Cheshire Masons, it is based in Cheshire. However, its name was not chosen at random. It derives of course from the openness of the Open University itself. Like OU, Omnium Lodge is open to all, and we are very happy to accept members from any Province within our Constitution. Omnium is also dedicated to travelling to your part of the Constitution as well. Some of us had Forty-six Filipino Brethren attended the meeting, some coming all the way from the Philippines, as well as from various locations across the UK, for the occasion. One such Brother coming from the Philippines being,



rushed to Shelton after the meeting of Foster Gough Lodge No. 2706, at Wolverhampton, where Lodge Alexandra No. 1282 (SC) had enacted a fine demonstration of a typical Scottish Second Degree Ceremony, followed by a 'Burn's Night' influenced, Lunchtime Festive Board. One of us arrived just in time to see the new WM, W. Bro. Precious Bumanglag, install his Officers, which he did in a most proficient manner. VW Brother Jose "Joey" Seriano, Deputy District Grand Master, for the Masonic Region 1, Ilocos Norte, Ilocos Sur & Abra, in the North West of Luzon, the largest Island in the Philippines, Luzon being the location of the Capital City, Manila. A Deputy District Grand Master in the Philippines, is Deputy to the Grand Master in his Region, so he is the equivalent to a PGM under UGLE.

It was a truly memorable Festive Board, noisy, happy, laughing, smiling and with a true sense of fellowship, which is the Filipino way. I am sure that those present will remember

Though I may not understand the words, the sentiment is evident and it never fails to move me.

Freemasonry in the Philippines is strong and well regarded. It evinces strong attachment to Family, State, the Faith of the Brethren and Fellowship. It is part of Philippines' culture and history and I am immensely proud to be part

of Philippines Freemasonry, even though only as a regular visitor.

Most of my Masonic Visits (Outside of the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of the Philippines, which is held at the location where the incoming Grand Master resides), is in Metro Manila and in Mindanao, the second largest Island of the Philippines, in the South, (Well it would be. I

am a PPrJGW.), but it looks like I now have to expand my Masonic wanderings to include Ilocos Norte, Ilocos Sur & Abra!! Too late for this year's trip but for sure next year if I am spared.

W. Bro. Bumanglag's first visit as WM of Ceramic Lodge, was to bring VW Bro. Joey Seriano and Bro. Henry Daga (Ceramic Lodge) along to Staffordshire Provincial Grand Stewards' Lodge January Meeting, where another great night was had by all present. I do hope it

will not be their last visit.

I will be visiting Ceramic Lodge to support W. Bro. precious throughout his year in Office and I am sure that he would welcome your support too. Please visit you will sure of a really enjoyable evening.

Queeselet-St James Lodge Charity Donations

Queeselet – St James' Lodge No: 6887 meet at the Yenton Assembly rooms in Gravelly Hill, Erdington and over the last 18 months they have made numerous donations to local charities as well as making significant contributions to the 2024 Festival.

The Lodge Treasurer W. Bro David Byram has a tight grip on the purse strings, but he is also the Lodge Charity Steward and with the approval of the brethren he has made donations from the Lodge Relief Chest.

In 2022-2023 the Lodge donated over £1,500 to charities including Cancer Research, Macmillan Support, Parkinson's UK, the British Red Cross Ukraine Appeal and local Children's Charities and Foodbanks. A number of these donations being made following the personal experiences of some brethren or a general desire to provide relief to others at times of urgent need.

The Lodge recently donated to Retina UK, the charity, which receives no government support, is a charity supporting people affected by inherited sight loss and funds investigation and medical research to help make their challenges a thing of the past.



It was back in September 2022, David was approached by his friend Cass Farrar and asked to sponsor him as he had entered the London marathon in support of Retina UK, David had previously been involved in a number of fund-raising events with Cass.

At around this period David had undergone a cataract operation and for a few days he was left sightless in his left eye, this caused him great discomfort and concern until his vision gradually returned over time. He is due undergo a further similar operation soon on his right eye.

David and Cass grew up in a village north of Sunderland and the two fervent Sunderland fans have remained friends for over 60 years. Cass had met his wife Bethan when they were teachers in London and they had three children, their eldest child, Lucy suffers from a quite common but incurable condition called Retinitis Pigmentosa.

When Lucy was young Cass and Bethan at first thought she was rather clumsy until a check-up at Moorfields Hospital for an astigmatism revealed that she had Retinitis Pigmentosa and that in time she would go blind. Her sight deteriorated gradually until now she only detects light and dark.

From 11 years of age, Lucy attended Dorton House school for the blind and then Greenwich University where she gained a degree in psychology and now works for TfL. She married Andy who is also registered blind with Stargardts, a form of macular degeneration. He has his own piano tuning business, and they have two sighted children, Evie and Ollie.

Cass and Beth were most grateful and commented to David "You feel rather helpless when told that your child has an incurable disease and so we joined the British Retinitis Pigmentosa Society (BRPS) and became involved in fundraising. A few years ago, the BRPS Charity changed its name to Retina UK as the research it is involved in includes other retinal problems not just RP. We really appreciate the very kind donation from the Masons and thank you on behalf of Retina UK and be assured that funds go towards research that we hope and pray will eventually lead to a cure for many retinal eye conditions".
