Staffordshire Wildlife Trust

Children in North Staffordshire can enjoy the great outdoors, thanks to a grant of £57,812 from Staffordshire Freemasons. Well over 2,000 disadvantaged local children and young people will be getting close to nature, thanks to a grant through the MCF to the Staffordshire Wildlife Trust.



The grant will support Wildplay sessions for children from under-represented urban communities in Staffordshire Moorlands and Stoke-on-Trent, including those in care, refugees, and those with special educational needs.

The Wildplay sessions will include creative play and crafting, exploring nature reserves and taking part in a wide range of activities from pond dipping to natural crafts to wildlife identification. The children will benefit from spending time outside and forming lifelong connections with nature. This money will help children and their families, and potentially change their lives. The Trust believes everyone should be able to access and enjoy nature, no matter where they live. Hundreds of children and young people will benefit over the course of the project, which begins in January 2024.

Aimee Burrows, Wildchild and Engagement Lead for the Trust, said:

"We're very grateful to Staffordshire Freemasons for their generous grant. This funding will allow us to bring the benefits and joy of nature to so many children that may otherwise not get to spend time exploring our county's wild spaces. Spending time outside can boost mental



health - one study found that 95 per cent of those that took part in outdoor play saw improvements in just six weeks!"

The PGM RW Bro John Lockley recently enjoyed a great Saturday afternoon at the Staffordshire Wildlife Trust near Rugeley and said: "I'm very pleased we've been

able to help Staffordshire Wildlife Trust with this vital project. It's a sad fact that many children grow up without regular access to nature and wild spaces. Outdoor activities, like those included in these Wildplay sessions, have many benefits. They will help children and young people to feel happier and healthier. It's hugely important for these families that this essential project is supported."





Relief Chest Presentation, Shelton Masonic Hall

On Saturday the 28th October over 35 brethren representing lodges & orders throughout the Province having enjoyed an excellent buffet lunch, watched a power point presentation by Dilharni Jayasinghe the MCF Relief Chest Manager and Karen Dye on all aspects of operating a Relief Chest. It was accepted that it will be a considerable time before GAE's are "Phased out" as many brethren are "Wary" of Online banking and using "Smart Phones" to make payments.

There followed a lively Q&A session when many "Myths" concerning Relief Chests were corrected and why "Dormant" relief

> chests (Those chests where no donations had been paid for two years) were in danger of being scrutinised by HMRC and having to repay the GAE tax back.

The PGM RW Bro John Lockley thanked the two ladies for coming from London on a Saturday to give us this presentation on how Relief Chests are run and looking forward to how they are to be developed in the next ten years.

They extolled the advantages of lodges having their own relief chests, how they could reclaim tax back on donations and the various methods that money could be paid into a lodge relief chest or the Staffordshire Festival Relief Chest.

It seems that donations made via Gift Aid Envelopes (GAE's) nationally average £8 per donation while donations made digitally, phone, card etc average £20. The use of Direct Debit payments (DD's or RPP's) makes payments so much easier for lodge charity stewards/ treasurers especially with the closure of many high street banks making the paying in of cash difficult.

It costs nearly £4 to process each batch of GAE's submitted to London and some donations are incorrectly credited due to poor handwriting or failure to mark the lodge number on the GAE slip. The MCF spends over £60,000 per year in printing the envelopes.

The Lewis

The origins of the Lewis as an instrument used in operative masonry is lost to history. It is known that the Romans used it and it probably goes back even farther than that. In modern times different types of tools are still referred to as a Lewis, although how they are used differs from the earliest forms. The origin of the name Lewis is also lost to history. There are some who believe Lewis was actually a proper name, perhaps the inventor of the tool. Others believe it could come from the Latin leva to lift (also levavi -lifted and levatum - raised).

The types of Lewis include the external Lewis, chain linked Lewis, split pin Lewis, two pinned Lewis and the three-legged Lewis. Regardless of the type of Lewis that is being



used the principals of the operation of the Lewis remain the same. By the use of friction and the weight of the object being lifted a Lewis is attached to the object and hoisted into place by attaching ropes or other appropriate lifting mechanisms to the Lewis.

With the various types of Lewis, the most commonly referred to in Freemasonry is the three-legged Lewis. This also goes by the names dovetailed Lewis, St. Peter's Keys and Wilson Bolt. The three-legged Lewis was inserted in a properly cut hole in the top of the stone. The object was then lifted into place and made part of the structure.

In speculative Freemasonry a Lewis is the son of a Freemason who joins the fraternity. As an analogy it is commonly meant that

the father raised (levatum) the son into position to take his place as part of the structure of Freemasonry.

Interestingly in descriptions of how ancient operative masons lifted the objects into place it is said that additional strapping is used to prevent a bump into scaffolding that would temporarily take some of the friction away causing the stone to fall before it could be placed. Extending the analogy of the Lewis in regard to speculative masons, the straps could be viewed as other members in the lodge who assist in the raising of the new stone into place.

Some American lodges provide Lewis jewels for their members. Requirements vary from jurisdiction to jurisdiction as to what makes an individual eligible for a Lewis jewel. It is almost always that the father and son are both masons. What can vary is when the father became a mason. In some jurisdictions it is required that the father be a mason before the son is born.

Invictus Games Dusseldorf 2023

The Invictus Games were held in Germany for the first time in 2023. The German Armed Forces and the City of Düsseldorf jointly hosted this unique international sports event. The goal of the games is to give soldiers who are wounded, injured or ill in body and soul a greater awareness and recognition in society and to support their path in rehabilitation.

Under the motto "A HOME FOR RESPECT." the city, together with the German Armed Forces, welcomed around 500 competitors from 21 nations and approximately 1,000 family members and friends to compete in ten disciplines. Mathew Trigg, a Staffordshire Freemason and Junior Warden of Ceramic Lodge No. 3287 was a proud member of the UK wheelchair Basketball team who went to Dusseldorf.

After a couple of years at College, Matt, who grew up in Stoke on Trent joined the Army aged 19 as an armourer in the Royal Electrical Mechanical Engineers and thought this was to be his career path. The Army actively supports many different sports as participation encourages physical fitness, mental resilience, leadership, teamwork, creates a competitive edge and inspiring a will to win.

Matt had been active in many sports including rugby and badminton, but he excelled at skiing and was selected to attend a course in Austria. But, whilst racing there unfortunately he suffered a serious injury shattering his femur, part of his pelvis and damaging three knee ligaments. He suffered a pulmonary embolism and had to be resuscitated, thankfully he survived but this ended his career in the military.

It took Matt nearly two years to learn to walk again and recuperate from these serious injuries which still affect him and his movement. After leaving the Army Matt





became involved in sales in 'civvy street', rising to management level before then joining the Home Office where he is currently employed. But his sporting interest never left him and despite having never played wheelchair basketball before, he became involved in the sport and over the next six years, he played at his local club competing in the national league.

The desire to compete and wish to become involved in the Invictus games drove him on and after rigorous multisport training camps and selection procedures with many other service personnel, Matt was interviewed and



eventually invited to join the UK Invictus team. It was a truly memorable and proud moment when he collected the team kit, with others who he had formed bonds of friendship with and a camaraderie which he had missed from his service days.

Despite their best efforts the UK team lost in the semi-final to the eventual winners, the USA. But Matt returned home full of pride with a bronze medal, incredible memories having made many new friends and meeting Prince Harry. Also, he was the only player to be presented with a USA team shirt by the Americans as he had scored the most 'baskets' against them.

Matt is now training hard for the next games in Canada, and we wish him well.





The Norah Mitchell (Minerva Lodge) Trust Fund

On the morning of Saturday 18th

November at Hanley Masonic Hall in Shelton, Minerva Lodge No. 1942 held their annual Norah Mitchell Trust Fund charity grant event. This year £3,000 was donated to six local charities (£500 each).

The money was left to Minerva Lodge by a Norah Mitchell the sister of a lodge member with charity donations being given at various times from the lump sum.

The charities to benefit at this event were:

1. Mill Meece Pumping Station Preservation Trust.

Work to preserve the two steam engines and other items which pumped water from boreholes to supply Stoke-on-Trent and Newcastle. They are now the only pair of steam engines of their type still in working order in Britain.

2. North Staffs Rowing Club.

Formed in the 1980s and based at Rudyard Lake. Its object is 'The promotion of community participation in healthy recreation for the benefit of the people of North Staffordshire by the provision of facilities for amateur rowing.'

3. Diabetes UK – North Staffs Local Group.

Supports Diabetics and provides funds for

research. Sponsors local children to special centres to learn how to live with diabetes.

4. Ruff and Ruby.

Based in Hanley. An award-winning faithbased charity, engage, energise and empower young people to realise their value. reach their potential and reframe their world by promoting posture, self-esteem and aspirations.

5. Tri-Services Veterans Support Centre.

Based in Newcastle. Run by veterans for veterans. Assisting armed services veterans with benefits, housing, wellbeing and health issues.

6. Mothers Mind (Staffordshire).

Based at Birches Head, Stoke-on-Trent. Provide support and advice for expectant and new mothers experiencing maternal mental health difficulties. Hold meetings twice a week which new mothers and their children attend.

all the Companions of the Chapter. The Scribe E., E.Comp. K.J. Spencer delivered an abbreviated history of the Chapter's 100 years and everyone in attendance was presented with a copy of the Chapter history. Following the Convocation all Companions enjoyed an excellent 5 course festive board.





Etruscan Chapter No.546 celebrates its 150th Anniversary

On Monday 6th November 2023 Etruscan Chapter's regular meeting at Shelton, Stoke on Trent was given over to a celebration of 150 years since its consecration.

The Chapter was originally founded in July 1873 even though the Charter had been granted the previous November, and it met at the Masonic Rooms, Caroline Street, Longton, Stoke on Trent. It continued to meet there, the 'home' of Etruscan Lodge, until 1948 when it moved to its present base at the Masonic Hall at Shelton.

The evening was graced with the presence of the Grand Superintendent, E. Comp. Robin Stubbs, the Deputy Grand Superintendent, E. Comp. Ralph Howarth, the Provincial Second Grand Principal, E. Comp. Paul Lockley and 12 other Supreme Grand Chapter (including the P.G.M. John Lockley) and acting Provincial Grand Chapter officers plus a goodly number of other guests and members.

The meeting began on a sad note with a eulogy and mark of respect in memory of E. Comp. Denis Fielding. Denis was installed as 1st Principal of the Chapter at the meeting in April this year but sadly died of a brain haemorrhage 2 months later. Then the mood lightened and this was followed by a nearfaultless exaltation of Comp. Daniel Poole of Josiah Wedgwood Lodge during which E. Comp. Andy Mapperson acted as M.E.Z.. He then handed over control to the I.P.Z., E. Comp. Brett Turner-Farmer for the rest of the proceedings.





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A short talk by the Chapter D.C., E. Comp. David Robinson, was followed by a presentation of a copy of the history of the Chapter to the Grand Superintendent who responded with some interesting "nuggets" of historical information concerning the period when the Chapter was founded. He and the Provincial Scribe E., E. Comp. Matt Gibbons, then presented the Principals with a certificate of congratulation on behalf of the Province.

Following the rest of the usual business items of the Chapter, which included a proposition to donate a further £400 to the Staffordshire Province 2024 Festival, the Companions adjourned to the dining room. Despite an arson attack on the building the night before the meeting, a very pleasant and convivial festive board took place. There was amusement that, because the 1st Principal and Principal Sojourner were sitting at opposite ends of a very long table, the ancient toasts had to be almost shouted. The jovial atmosphere was further enhanced by celebrating the birthdays of both the Principal Sojourner and 3rd Principal with port being served to all who wished to partake. After all the usual Royal Arch toasts and speeches the Companions departed for their homes at around 10:15 pm.

On behalf of all of us at SSCBB, thank you and all the brethren of the Province of Staffordshire for their most generous donation of £10,500. As you know, we plan to use the funds to purchase a new blood bike which will carry a masonic name. We look forward to the official 'handover' of the blood bike in February 2024.

2024 will be a very special year for our charity as we will be celebrating our 10th Anniversary. We have been fortunate in those 10 years to have 4 blood bikes purchased for us by various Masonic groups.

SSCBB was established in 2014 and covers an extensive geographic area, in Shropshire, Staffordshire and Cheshire. We have a mission to support the NHS by the provision of secure courier transport for any urgent medical requirements to enhance patient care; to promote a positive image of the motorcycling community and to encourage safe riding standards.

Urgent deliveries are completed on the Charities motorcycles ridden by advanced qualified riders. Our volunteer Controllers are on standby 24 hours a day to receive urgent requests. Another vital role within the charity are the Event Fundraisers who raise funds and awareness of SSCBB at supermarkets, bike shows and local initiatives. There is also an established 'Speaker Team' of volunteers who give talks at a variety of organisations.

Blood Bikes transport blood, platelets, various test samples, frozen breast milk, fmt, bone marrow as well as patient records and medical equipment. During the Covid pandemic, we were called upon to transport Covid samples, PPE, pulse oximeters and other vital equipment.
