Signing the Armed Forces Covenant

Staffordshire Freemasons were the first in the Country to sign the Armed Forces Covenant, which commits the Freemasons to honour the Armed Forces Covenant and support the Armed Forces Community. Recognising the value Serving Personnel, both Regular and Reservists, Veterans and military families contribute to our business and our country.



The Lord Lieutenant of Staffordshire, Ian Dudson, together with John Lockley, Head of Staffordshire Freemasons and Lieutenant Colonel Pete Brunton, Commanding Officer, 16 Signal Regiment based in Stafford led the event at the Freemasons Memorial Garden at the National Memorial Arboretum, Alrewas near Lichfield on Thursday 23rd September.

The Lord Lieutenant praised the partnership between the Freemasons and the Armed Forces and their loyalty to the Queen. He further stated the Covenant would be beneficial to both organisations.

In signing the Covenant on behalf of Staffordshire Freemasons John Lockley stressed the value of the Armed Forces to the country and the privilege it will be to support them in the future.

Lieutenant Colonel Pete Brunton signing of

behalf of the Ministry of Defence, stated how much he and his regiment enjoyed living in Staffordshire with its wonderful infrastructure, such as education and health which is so important to the Armed Forces. Personnel must often relocate both at home and abroad and easy access to such services is very important. He also welcomed the partnership with Freemasonry and looked forward to working together in the future.

The event was supported by many people including members of the Armed Forces and Staffordshire Freemasons and their families.

On Wednesday 20th October held at Freemasons' Hall in Covent Garden the Armed Forces Covenant was signed in a ceremony led by His Royal Highness, The Duke of Kent and Major General Simon Graham, Director Reserves Army, on behalf of the Ministry of

Also, on the same day heads of Freemasonry in the Isle of Man, Cheshire, East Lancashire, West Lancashire and North Wales also made their commitment to the Armed Forces Covenant. In total 24 Provinces have either signed or will sign the Covenant. The Masonic Charitable Foundation and the RMBI will also sign the covenant in December 2021 at their AGM.



Supporting the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal 2021

This year's poppy appeal will take place between 28th October and 13th November. The Royal British Legion has a long-term relationship with the Freemasons and this year is no exception as they once again ask for our valued support.

This is, of course, part of our Armed Forces Covenant and in supporting it are also supporting our Brethren and Companions who are part of Her Majesty's Armed Forces, as well as the relatives of personnel who have made the ultimate sacrifice.

The Poppy collections will take place at the local supermarkets listed below and it is hoped that the Brethren and Companions of the Province will assist the RBL at these collection points.

The supermarkets will store the equipment and supplies and will take care of the collection boxes at the end of each day.

It is hoped that, with our support, the RBL can staff the



collection stall for as many days and hours as possible to get the maximum impact and support for the RBL Poppy Appeal.

The suggested "shifts" at each collection point are for two hours, or more if you are available and able to do so.

Despite a year which was blighted by the pandemic, the Lodge dedicated itself to raise and distribute funds equal to its Lodge number - 4281. That target was roundly beaten and the Lodge eventually distributed over £5,000 to local charities.

Then, exactly 100 years to the day since the Lodge was consecrated, over seventy Provincial Grand Lodge members, Lodge members and guests attended its Centenary celebrations. Thanks to great planning, tons of behind the scenes effort and the combined talents of the Lodge, the event will be remembered for many years to come.

The meeting also proved once again that charity is at the heart of what Freemasons are about. A cheque for a further £1,500 was presented to the Head of Staffordshire Freemasons, John Lockley in support of the 2024 Festival (an event supported by all Staffordshire Lodges which aims to raise £1.5million for charity by 2024) and during a most enjoyable meal, members

and guests donated a total of over £1,000 which will be used to support the work of the Lodge Almoner and of charities throughout the Stafford area.

Well, when Bro. David moved to Staffordshire, from Sussex, in 1997, he

had already contacted Staffordshire Provincial Grand Stewards' Lodge and subsequently, in 1998, became its first joining member, progressing to WM in 2005. It was not unexpected then, when Bro. David asked the Provincial Secretary, if, when it was time for him to receive his 50 Year Certificate. could he have it presented at Staffordshire Provincial Stewards' Lodge. The presentation was arranged for the same evening as the Installation, on Monday 27th September. That presentation was supposed to be a surprise too. However, that presentation couldn't be kept secret any more than the first one! So, after the Installation Ceremony, the Provincial Grand Master, RW Bro. John Lockley. presented Bro. David with his English 50 Year Certificate, in such a sincere and personal

meeting and the Right Worshipful Master, Bro. Andy Honest, accompanied by two Past Masters, Bro. Joe Robinson and Bro. Matt Wainwright, of St. Werburga Lodge, Derbyshire, whose invitation to Lodge Alexandra Brethren to come and see his Third, led to the first part of this article.

You might be forgiven for thinking that the day could not have been made any better for Bro. David. Well it could and it was. That morning, Bro. David received a call from the Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Scotland's Office, advising him that they had received notification, from the MW Grand

Master of the Grand Lodge of the Philippines, of a patent granted in Bro. David's name, appointing him as the Representative of the Grand Lodge of the Philippines near (at) The Grand Lodge of Scotland. Have you ever heard the saying, "I thought all my birthdays had come at once"? Bro. David understands exactly how that feels!

The meeting was followed by a most convivial Festive Board. All Stewards Festive Boards are convivial, but for Bro. David, this one was extra convivial. Now the story might finish there, but it doesn't. RW Bro. Steven Varley has been heard to remark, "I have never been a Provincial Steward, so I can't join my own Provincial Grand Stewards Lodge." W.Bro. REVD. Bernard Buttery, PJGD, PPrSGW

The 12th February 2021 was the 50th anniversary of W.Bro. Revd. Bernard Buttery's initiation into Etruscan Lodge. Because of the restrictions on physical meetings due to the Covid pandemic, it

Bernard and Alan thus became brothers in law and a very close and long friendship ensued. Alan went on to speak about Bernard's career as a teacher, starting in Wolverhampton and going on the become head teacher at several Schools in Staffordshire. Alan also informed those present of Bernard's deep Christian faith and his long service in the Church of England; his ministry starting as a Lay Reader and subsequently as an Ordained Priest.

The Provincial Grand Master paid tribute to Bernard's long, devoted service and great commitment to Freemasonry in general and the Province of Staffordshire in particular. The Provincial Grand Secretary then read the 50yr Certificate prior to it being presented by the Provincial Grand Master. The Provincial Grand Master then promoted Bernard to Past Provincial Senior Grand Warden.

The Worshipful Master, Brett Turner-Farmer, then presented Bernard with gifts from the Lodge. These were a number of Bible study books which Bernard's had chosen to complete his set, and a bottle of his favourite single malt whisky.

Bernard expressed his gratitude to all for attending. In addition he thanked the Provincial Grand Master for his kind words, the promotion and the 50 year certificate. He especially thanked Alan Astle for his tribute and for their many

> years as friends, brothers and brothers in law. He also said how grateful he was for the gifts from the Lodge. He then reminisced about the past 50 years including some memorable Past Masters of the Lodge, those he had introduced into the Lodge and many other things. Burslem Chapter No: 98


A recently refreshed Burslem


Stafford Masonic Club chairman

The Cornerstone Project

During the pandemic the Masonic Charitable Foundation has been making grants to support various charities throughout the country.


Phase 3 of the grants aimed at young people's mental health has recently been awarded, and a project put together by E Comp Ralph Howarth, together with one of the NHS Commissioner's for Staffordshire, Lorna Scott submitted a successful bid to support mental wellbeing for young people in Staffordshire.

The grant of £23,870 is being used to fund a partnership-based support scheme across three main areas in Staffordshire – Stoke, Stafford, Cannock – where young people have been identified as being most vulnerable with their mental health.

Sadly, many young people wait for many months, or even years, to get the support they so vitally need, and this funding will help them to move forward with their mental wellbeing.



The three courses are sports based, with numerous activities including multisports, angling and horse-riding over the course of a week, which the young people would not normally be able to access. The participants have been identified through referrals to the NHS and now, because of this funding, can access support and wellbeing based on exercise and outdoor activities. The sports sessions are being run by Together Active and within the sports sessions are several mental wellbeing sessions provided by MIND. These mental wellbeing sessions, based on "walking and talking" about their



problems and concerns, shared in a safe environment, are bespoke to the individual and aimed at giving the young people the tools to support their future mental wellbeing as well as signposting to other forms of support that may be needed long term.

It is hoped that this project will be the foundation of a longer-term plan to support the mental health of our Province's young people.

Lorna Scott said "I'm very grateful to Staffordshire Freemasons for supporting this project and in turn supporting the mental wellbeing and development of our young people in Staffordshire. Ralph has been involved in mental health and wellbeing training with our organisation and because of this link has kindly worked with me to develop this much needed funding bid. We are looking forward to working with our Masonic community in the future and developing a long-lasting relationship."
