R.E.Kt David Gary Read, Knight Commander of the United Orders and Provincial Prior of the Province of Staffordshire and Shropshire

On Wednesday, 30th January 2019, the Knight Templar Province was shaken to the core by the sudden and tragic death of their much respected and beloved leader, R.E.Kt David Gary Read. Everyone who knew Gary have their abiding and fond memories of him. A brilliant comedic with he had a ready smile for everyone. He was a giant of a man and that was not a reference to his stature. He was a giant in his friendliness towards every member of our Order, especially those who had just joined. His compassion to all those that were ill or in any need whatsoever. His love that he had for his wife, Vivienne, during the long time they had together and the love shown to the very end of his

daughter Stephanie and, the apple of his eye, his teenage grandson, Joseph and lastly, his sense of duty, commitment and responsibly towards our Order and Freemasonry in general.

David Gary Read was born on the 9th June, 1944 in Wellington, Shropshire. His mother was an opera singer and had auditioned at Covent Garden but, unfortunately, she died at a very young age. He was then brought up by his father in his home village of Rhosllanerchrugog, North Wales where he was a tenor in the Rhos Male Voice Choir. Unfortunately, Gary did not inherit a singing voice from his parents but he did show a great ability at a young age and that was in drawing and art.

He was educated at Rhos Boys School where all the lessons were taught in Welsh and, latterly, at Wrexham College now Wrexham University. He had the accolade of being the first on record to be

top in art throughout the whole of his school life. During the time at Wrexham College he won a national competition for a painting depicting a scene with Jesus carrying the cross just before the crucifixion, named "The Great Day".

Leaving school they wanted him to follow art as a career. However, he believed that Art was in no way going to earn him a regular income so due to his studies in interior decorating and design and management he obtained employment as a manager with a national industrial decorating contracting company. After five years he started his own decorators merchants business continuing in contracting. Over the years his business portfolio increased with a hardware shop, giftware shop, a café and he could not resist an art gallery - which was in Lichfield. In 2006 he sold his businesses and went into retirement.

He joined Round Table at the age of 27 and served in all the offices becoming Chairman in 1975 and served on the National Committee, retiring at 40 due to their rules. He then joined the 41 Club for Past Tablers and was Chairman in 1990 and remained a member to his death.

In Freemasonry Gary was initiated into St. Johns Lodge of Lichfield No. 1039 in February 1980 and was Master in 1990. In the Craft Province of Staffordshire he held the ranks of Provincial Grand Sword Bearer (1996), Provincial Senior Grand Warden (1999), Assistant Provincial Grand Master (2004) and Deputy Provincial Grand Master (2009).

In the UGLE he held the ranks of PAGDC (2002), PSGD (2005) and PGSwdB (2009)

In the United Orders he was installed as a Knight Templar in William de Ferrars Preceptory No. 530 in 1988 and was Eminent Preceptor in 1999. In Provincial Priory he was appointed Provincial Deputy Marshal (1999), Provincial Marshal (2005), Provincial Sub-Prior (2007) and Provincial Prior (2009).

In Great Priory he was appointed P.Gt.Ade-C (2002), P.Gt.Std.B.(B) (2007), Provincial Prior (2009) and KCT (2017). He also held senior rank in the Royal Arch, Rose Croix, Knights Templar Priests, Knights Beneficent of the Holy City and St.Thomas of Acon.

In our Order he will be also remembered for his push to raise funds for the St. John of Jerusalem Eye Hospital, spearheaded so well by his bodyguard. In recent years the Province raised enough money to send St. John's Ambulance cadets to the Hospital on two separate occasions with each pair taking with them a generous

donation from the Knights of Staffordshire & Shropshire.

In 2018 he challenged the Province to take part in the Hospital's Swift Appeal. This meant raising £5,000 more for the hospital during the year than had been done the previous year. He was not disappointed in his Province's response for the challenge was not only met but was doubled. The result is that not only will we have one bronze swift inscribed with the name of the Province but there will now be a second bronze swift and that will be dedicated to the memory of David Gary Read. Both swifts will be hung on the tree on the site of the original Hospital in the Old Town of Jerusalem at Muristan. A number his Knights and their families will be visiting the Holy Land at the end of October this year to visit the Hospital and see the swifts on display, which will be extremely moving.

Modifying the words of the Craft "Gary lived so well respected and died so much regretted,"

If you are attending the meeting, there are a number of important briefing matters that you should be aware of, as follows:

- There will NOT be a separate briefing for 'Appointed and Promoted Officers', as in previous years.
- Please arrive at the Venue in good time to be seated by
 4.15pm prompt.
- Worshipful Masters and Lodge Wardens should wear their lodge collars of office.

- The newly appointed 'Active Provincial Officers' are to collect their respective collar jewels on arrival, in the reception foyer from the Prov. Assist. G. Sec, therefore please arrive in good time to receive them and attach it to your collar before the commencement of the meeting.
- The newly appointed and promoted officers will have a designated seat in the temple, therefore please arrive in good time to locate it. There will be two P.G.L.Stewards available to assist you and direct you.
- There will be a briefing by myself from the stage at 4.25pm.
- When the 'Appointment & Investiture of Officers' item of the agenda takes place, if you are the recipient of an Active Provincial Office OR First Appointment to a Past Provincial Rank, you are

required to **REMOVE** your collar before being presented to the R. W. P. G. M. for Investiture.

- If you are being **Promoted to a Past Provincial Rank**, you are required to **WEAR** your collar when being presented to the R.W.P.G.M., who will congratulate you.
- The Breast Jewels to be worn are the Royal Arch Jewel and the 2024 Festival Jewel (if appropriate) OR the Tercentenary Jewel only. No other Jewels are to be worn i.e. Founder's Jewels, Past Master's Jewels etc.
- At the close of the P.G.L. Meeting, Active Provincial Officers are to return to the temple for a Provincial Photograph to be taken.
- Please be reminded that all Mobile Phones should at least be in 'Silent' mode, preferably SWITCHED OFF.

News from the Provincial Grand Almoner

Masonic Support – A Mason's Story

I'm often asked about support from the Masonic Charitable Foundation and how it assists the Brethren of our Province and their families.

Whilst I can tell you stories about what can be provided and assist with applications therie's no better way to tell you about these grants than by introducing you to someone who has been a recipient and knows firsthand about the process and support that is available.

Meet Mark Sewell from Castellum Lodge in Newcastle. The story that follows is his journey of support for him and his family.



"I joined Freemasonry in 2006 I was initiated into Birchwood lodge 5178 in the Province of Hertfordshire. I did not know anything about Freemasonry, or the work carried out around the globe. I even thought that the lodge I joined was the only one. From that start I learned that I had thousands of Brothers around the world all of similar mind set.

My story with the Masonic Charitable Foundation starts when in July 2011, I was racing my Honda at Mallory

Park. It was a fantastic day, Sunny,

warm and all of my Family and close friends were with me. At approximately 4.25pm at the end of the start and finish straight reaching 125mph I applied the front break at the 100-yard marker (to feel a snapping sensation through the bike)

At this point there was no brake from the front of my Honda. It is true everything slows right down as you enter into an accident. I remember looking at my front brake lever, then at the corner, lying the bike into the right hander to get as far as I could before I ran out of track, I remember seeing my leg being broken (in 5 places I learned after), I remember putting the bike down on its right hand side, I even remember seeing it slide away from me. Everything went extremely fast as I caught the rumble strip with my tender bottom. From this point it was a blur to say the least. It's only from watching the race from the TV playback that I saw why. Instead of sliding graciously onto the grass by catching the rumble strip I was thrown upwards and barrel rolled quite viciously (apparently, I scored well on the dismount and the cartwheels but lost points on the floor work) Marshals are like masons when it comes to a sick sense of humour brethren.

Forward 6 months and while lying in a hospital bed only able to see the ceiling I was given the Masonic magazine and as I opened it a small card fell out with MCF with a phone number to call if you required help.

I must explain that at this point Brethren I was at the lowest mentally and physically (You may say perhaps from circumstances of unavoidable calamity and misfortune, are I was reduced to the lowest ebb of poverty and distress. I had lost all income from the 3 companies I owned. Turned my family's world upside down and lost the will to carry on.

My injuries meant that I would be confined to a wheelchair for the rest of my life, leaving my children to grow up without the physical support that a father gives and my wife as my permanent carer.

The MCF went on to support me and my family up until the start of 2019 when I won my case for mechanical defect on my bike. For eight years my Lodge Almoner and Provincial Grand Almoners were there for me; guiding me through the application process and supporting my case with the MCF. Through their help and advice, all freely given, I was able to continue with my life albeit swapping my motorcycle for a wheelchair. My family were able to do what they wanted continuing through university and all the time I was supported.

The Masonic Charitable Foundation

What is the Masonic Charitable Foundation? The Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF) builds better lives by enabling opportunity, advancing healthcare and education and promoting independence for Freemasons, their families and the wider community. The MCF is one of the



largest grant-making charities in the country supporting Freemasons and their families as well as charities across England and Wales.

Financial

The financial grants help Masonic families who are unable to afford everyday living costs and to actively participate in their community.

Health

The grants help Masonic families get the treatment, care or support they need to live healthy and independent lives.

Family

The grants help Masonic families by providing opportunities for young people and a range of high-quality care provision.

Those seeking support must be a Freemason or have a strong family connection to a Freemason. A Freemason is someone who is or was a member of a Lodge regulated by the United Grand Lodge of England. This includes Freemasons in England, Wales, the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man as well as members of overseas Lodges which follow the English Constitution.

- We define a strong family connection as a Freemason's:
- married or life partner
- widow or surviving partner; divorced or separated partner;
- child (under 25) in full-time education

Other relations may also qualify for support if they can demonstrate that a Freemason has provided them with significant financial or physical support.

I want to take you back to The Mason, As Freemason's we are Good Men, Proud Men, Men who will at the drop of a hat help a brother or friend in time of need.

What we are extremely bad at is accepting help especially financial help. It seems to be that we give freely but can't receive.

Freemasonry was set up to make good men better and at a time of need to support a friend or Brother.

I would not be hear today Brethren if it was not for the small calling card that was in the Masonic Magazine, The help from MCF W.Bro Alan Walker, W.Bro John Skellern, W.Bro John Derry, W.Bro Ralph Howarth all Provincial Grand Almoners from 2011 through to 2019.

But most of all, W.Bro Mick Palfreman, who invited me to join this wonderful family.

Please Brethren we are here to help, we love to help. It's not an embarrassment to swallow your pride and ask, remember tomorrow it could be you that needs help and support."

Okay, that described the journey of one of our Brethren - but what about the Province as a whole?

In 2018 Freemasons and their families; 89 beneficiaries to be precise; received support to a total of nearly £160,000.

In the first quarter of 2019 £32,400 had been given to those applying for support. Bear in mind that all of the grant recipients have these reviewed every year and the support can continue as long as it is needed and they qualify.

Brethren, please don't wait until you are at the lowest point and think that you can't turn to anybody. Don't hesitate to speak to your Almoner or me so we can get the support into place that you need.

Provincial Grand Charity Steward's Corner

The countdown to the Festival has begun, one year down five to go!!! Do I think the £2 million target is still possible?

Yes! it most certainly is, but it will require a determined effort from all the brethren? Is it worth it? Yes! it most certainly is.

Last year Freemasons gave some £48.1 million pounds to good causes, locally, nationally and through the MCF. To further dispel the "Myth" that Freemasons only look after themselves, although some 48% of this money went to supporting Freemasons and their families, the majority, went to supporting local and national charities. The MCF which our Festival is in aid of, last year donated some £155,865 in supporting Staffordshire Masons and their families, whilst they also supported nine local charities to the tune of £109,232. This is money coming back into Staffordshire from the MCF and not as is often thought disappearing into some 'Black Hole' in London never to be seen again.

I have been visiting lodges throughout the Province giving brethren (I hope!) a better understanding of "Why we are having and the need for a Festival" so that they can see why I need them to give generously to the 2024 Festival. I cannot emphasis the necessity for brethren to set up an RPP (Regular Payment Plan) or Direct Debit as soon as possible. By starting now, for less than the price of a cup of coffee or a single newspaper per week, a brother can easily reach the qualifying level of a Festival Patron, a target easily reached by most. This way we can reach our target.

Over the next few years we will be having some major events to raise money for the Festival. January saw the launch of a 'Provincial Burns Night' at the County Show Ground organised by that dynamic duo, Wayne Lutton and David Evans. This duo with the help of their team raised over £7500 and saw 400 masons, many dressed in kilts for the first time (take care when sitting down in a kilt!), enjoy a full entertainment packed evening in support of the Festival. Well done to you all.

In June this year the PGM John Lockley will be risking "Life & Limb" in support of the Festival when he takes part in a sponsored "Zip Ride" on the longest line in Europe, falling some 600ft over one mile reaching possible speeds of over 120mph. Should the breaking system fail, I have assured him that ALL the sponsored pledges will stand so that his efforts will not have been in vain. Naturally funeral details will be announced later. The event is organised by John Treanor the former "M" Fest Chairman, who we hold responsible for any mishaps!

A 2024 Festival Facebook page is being set up to keep you all informed of events that are being organised to support the Festival. I hope that lodges who arrange events in support of the Festival use this page to inform all brethren not only in this Province but neighbouring ones as well of their activities, BBQ's, Fetes & dinners etc so they can get maximum support and prevent clashing dates and therefore raise oodles of money going towards our target.

On a more serious note, the Prostate screening programme has got onto a flying start. One hundred brethren were screened at Wolverhampton in February and several brethren have been seen at Burton hospital for follow up / treatment. Additional screenings have been arranged at Shelton and Aldridge in April and May. Although the services of the Consultant and her staff are free to us, they do this service in their own time and receive no payment. We have donated a considerable amount of money to the consultants' charity and the blood bikes scheme (who move the samples to Burton hospital) from the SMCA "B" fund. What a better way to spend your donations to the SMCA than in saving the lives of Staffordshire Freemasons. I must declare an interest in this, for as the Festival logo is "Your Province Needs You", as your charity steward, my logo is "Your Province Need you ALIVE" otherwise you won't be able to send me your money for the Festival.!!!!!

Having obtained the proper clearence from UGLE we set off to visit Kardeslik (Brotherhood) Lodge and Erguvan (Judas Tree) Lodge in Istanbul. Both Lodges meet in the Grand Lodge of Turkey buildings in the Beyoglu district of Istanbul. Franz List stayed for five weeks in part of this building during his visit in 1847 to the Otoman Empire. One of thebest attributes of this venue is the roof top bar with fabulous views of the Bosphorus.

The most moving impression of the visit was the warm welcome and hospitality we received from the Brethren of both Lodges. They changed the dates of their meetings to accommodate us and put in an enormous amount of work in conducting the meetings in English for our benefit.

At the Kardeslik Lodge we witnessed a Passing Ceremony of five young Brethren. To assist us in following the ceremony we were presented with English translations of approved Turkish Ritual of the Initiation and Passing Ceremonies. We were also presented with a Jewel of the Kardeslik lodge and a certificate of attendance countersigned by the President of the Foreign Relationship Committee.

The WM, Aykut Kocatürk presented Past Deputy PGM of Cambridgeshire, VWBro. Tim Higgins a reed Flute.

At the Erguvan Lodge we witnessed an Initiation Ceremony for two candidates. Again most of the ceremony was conducted in English which we followed reading a folder presented to each of us. The WM Özcan Özmen then presented us with a Lodge Lapel Pin. At the Festive Board W

Bro Mark Long sang the Entered Apprentices Song followed by a toast with our Masonic fire.



To the Worship Masters of both lodges were presented with an Entered Apprentices Apron symbolising the Badge of Innocence and a Bond of Friendship together with a History Book of the Scientific Lodge No 88 founded in 1754.

During the day we were taken to all the historic sites and museums in Istanbul assisted by our own personal guide. In between the evocation of ancient history and the sights and sounds of Istanbul, we charged ourselves with food and drink at hostelries specially selected by our

The European Masonic Association

In 1987 several brethren met together and in principle agreed to form a group of European Masons with a view to understanding Masonic culture from each other's countries. This quickly evolved to Masonic. Cultural and Social Understanding between Brethren in Europe and a proposed Constitution and Bye Laws for a European Masonic Association (EMA).

The inaugural meeting of the EMA was held at The Masonic Centre, Frankfurt, Germany on December 2nd 1989 with 17 founding members from countries across Europe, including England, France, Germany, Italy, Northern Ireland, Scotland, Switzerland and The Netherlands and after consultation UGLE recognition was gained in 1990.

Today, as a UGLE recognised association (not a lodge) and over 130 members of all ranks from 14 countries within the continent of Europe there are two meetings held each year, a Spring meeting in the UK for the AGM and an Autumn meeting in another European country, both of which involve wives and partners.

The EMA are not in any way involved with the political European Union but an expanding Masonic Brotherhood of friendship and harmony on the continent of Europe. The essence of the constitution is that UGLE are the dominant Masonic body and no visits can be made to unrecognised lodges. All members must be in good standing with a lodge which is in fraternal accord and recognised by UGLE.

The formalities of the EMA meetings are managed and recorded by a team of three Executive officer's comprised of a Speaker, Secretary and treasurer supported by assistants who are elected at the AGM, where member applications are also considered.

The EMA meetings are typically organised as a 3 day event, but some members are known to extend their stay to make a full holiday.

A visit to a local lodge is included and formal EMA meetings are for members only whilst partners are entertained on cultural excursions to local places of interest.

Three members of Kibblestone Lodge No: 9504 attended the Kindred Lodges Association (KLA) autumn meeting hosted this year by Pathfinder Lodge No: 8236 at Tapton Masonic Hall, Sheffield in the Province of Yorkshire West Riding. A very interesting and descriptive talk then followed on 'Masonic Artifacts and what they tell us' by W. Bro Christopher Powell.

From 3 degrees to Two Wheels

Brother, are you a Biker?

Then a friendly, warm and fraternal Greeting to you!

For those of you who have never heard of the Widows Sons Masonic Bikers Association (WSMBA), they are a group of Freemasons within Great Britain that happen to have a passion for riding motorcycles and hold with the idea of universal brotherhood. The WSMBA was formed in 2004 and has since grown to 21 established Chapters located all around the UK with more chapters in the process of being formed. The Widows Sons originally formed in 1998 in the United States of America for Motorcycling Masons to raise charitable funds for widows and orphans. in America it was and still is, called the Widows Sons Masonic Riders Association.

History

In 2004 a charter was given by the American Widows Sons to form the Widows Sons Masonic Bikers Association in the UK. Once they had enough members four Chapters were created, the North East, North West, South East and South West and a Presidents Governing Board was formed - which now administers all UK activity. Close links are still maintained with their American brothers, often at the annual Rally, which in 2019 will be hosted by the West Mids Chapter in Lichfield.

The West Midlands Chapter received its charter in March 2014 and as of January 2018 have around 47 patched members and 8 Bad pennies, with several members waiting in the wings.

The goals of the WS are to introduce the pleasures of motorcycling to Masonic Brothers, raise Masonic Awareness in the world of motorcycling, support regular Masonic lodges through regular



attendance and assisting with, or attending, lodge events.

So, how do they achieve this?

They invite as many Masons as possible who are already motorcyclists or who have an interest in them, to come and join them. The West Midlands Chapter have regular meetings, at least once a month where they have breakfast and talk about events, both national and local, go for rides and just pass the time in masonic brotherhood. They raise Masonic Awareness in the world of motorcycling - and have a support group called "The Bad Pennies" which is open to membership by anyone - introducing them to Masonry, and likewise Masons to Motorcycling. Many wives, girlfriends and family are members, and quite a few non-Masonic motorcyclists, who have gone on to become Initiated.

They support Lodges by regular attendance in their own lodges, by visiting the lodges of other WS and attending and assisting at events. Some chapters of the Widows Sons have taken over failing craft lodges and Royal Arch chapters, with the blessing of the existing members, and are turning them in to motorcycle-orientated ones.

It's easy to join, you just need to be a Master Mason in good standing and ride a motorcycle that is capable of keeping up on ride outs. This means reliable and road worthy, not the ability to break speed limits. The badge of the WSMBA is worn on the left-hand breast of the jacket or vest, close to the heart. They do not wear Back Patches, but they do have a "road name" which is generally chosen by the individual initially, but can be changed



by the chapter at will, usually after some mishap or other 'event' involving the individual.

The WSMBA is recognised by UGLE

 the only Masonic motorcycling organisation outside of a specialist lodge to have this recognition.

THE BROTHER WHO DESIGNED THE SPITFIRE

One of the most important contributions to the success in World War 2 was the Supermarine Spitfire, initially designed by Freemason R.J.Mitchell, as Peter Hughes reveals...



The word 'genius', like many in the English language, h a s become

much overused in recent years and in consequence greatly devalued. There are, however, few men who richly deserve more this description than the 'Forgotten Hero' Reginald Joseph Mitchell. In so far as the general public recognises his name, Reginald (RJ) Mitchell is forever linked as the designer of the iconoclastic Spitfire fighter plane. His achievements, however, were so very much more.

Within Freemasonry, even fewer will know of his membership of the Craft from aged 26 in 1921 until his tragically early death aged 42. Mitchell was born in 1895 at Butt Lane, Stoke-on-Trent, one of five children. His father was a Yorkshire born deputy headmaster who later owned a significant printing company in the area. Mitchell senior was himself a Freemason and the founding organist and later Master in 1923 of Jasper Lodge No. 3934 meeting at Hanley, Stoke-on-Trent. It was into this Lodge, on Friday, 13th May 1921, that R. J. Mitchell was initiated as a Lewis. Mitchell's education and early years gave little indication of what was to come. There is anecdotal evidence that as a youngster he was already fascinated by the new invention called the airplane (it should be remembered that it was only in 1903 that the Wright Brothers achieved powered flight and 1908 before any working airplane flew over Britain). Otherwise, his education at Hanley High School was unremarkable. He was clearly bright, and a competent athlete but, as is so often the case, little to mark him out at that stage of his Indeed, at his father's life. Mitchell insistence, was apprenticed at 16 to a local electrical engineering company, a job he apparently hated. He also attended night school, where he later taught for a time.

It must have come as a bolt from the blue when, having applied for and secured a job in faraway Southampton with the small Supermarine airplane company, he told his family of his immediate move to take up the appointment. The company he joined was a modest part of the newly created British aviation industry, and at the time Supermarine specialised in building seaplanes. Such planes had many advantages during this period, not least the ease of finding somewhere to land! It was at Supermarine that R. J. Mitchell did all his work as an aircraft designer. When the company was absorbed into the Vickers industrial empire in 1928, Mitchell was made a director, and his financial situation was enhanced considerably. Indeed the takeover was conditional upon Mitchell continuing in post.

In moving to Southampton in 1917, Mitchell had left behind Florence Dayson, a headmistress whom he had married in 1916 in Stoke and who moved with him to Bullar Road, Southampton.

By 1920, Mitchell had become chief designer and chief engineer of Supermarine, and he was still only 25 years old. He set about creating his close knit design team of whom he was fiercely proud and protective. He could be direct, short tempered, even brutal, and he was without doubt single-minded. He was possessed of good looks, a ready smile for friends and a keen sense of humour. This was in contrast, in public at least, to the fact that he had a slight stammer and a shy demeanour. He was generous and warm to his team but possessed a fierce intolerance for those who did not meet his exacting standards.

Brother Mitchell was proposed into Jasper Lodge 3934 in 1921 not by his father, but by Brother Good, the Senior Warden and W. Brother Story, the Immediate Past Master. He was described as 'chief aviation engineer of Avenue Road, Itchin, Southampton.' His father, as Junior Warden, delivered the Charge on the night and there were a large number of visitors present, including seven from Brother Mitchell's old school Lodge, Hanliensian No. 3935, which meets still at Shelton, Stoke-on-Trent. Brother Mitchell attended on a regular basis to begin with, but those attendances fell away in direct proportion to his commitments with Supermarine many miles away at Southampton. Between 1920 and 1936 he designed 24 different aircraft ranging from light aircraft and fighters to huge flying boats and bombers - a

remarkable output during a 16- year period.

When Vickers took over Supermarine in 1928, they tried to

get Mitchell to work

with one of their own top designers, but he would leave the room when the other designer turned up. Vickers gave way and let the Supermarine design team carry on as before. Their own designer went back to Vickers proper. His name? Barnes Wallis inventor of the famous Dam Busters bouncing bomb and the Wellington bomber. Through the 1920s and 1930s Mitchell led his design team in creating a succession of ground-breaking aircraft. He achieved great national prominence as the chief designer of the aircraft which succeeded in winning the massively prestigious Schneider Trophy speed races for nations on three succeeding occasions, thereby retaining that Trophy for Britain. He also took numerous airspeed records in this period. During these few short years the aircraft had moved from a biplane contrivance made of wood canvas and wire capable at best of about 100 mph into the sleek mono-hulled steel-bodied machine we now recognise which took the

air speed record to 403 mph, and which evolved ultimately into the Spitfire design. The naming of the new aeroplane was carried out by the directors of Supermarine, who for a time were considering calling it "The Shrew". However, the decision was finally taken to keep the name given originally to the Type 224 - the Spitfire so named after the Chairman's self-willed granddaughter. Mitchell's sisterin-law Elsie recalls him saying: "Bloody silly sort of a name." In 1932 Mitchell was awarded the CBE for his outstanding work.

In 1933 he was diagnosed with cancer of the rectum and in August that year he had a colostomy bag strapped to his side. He was a shining example to cancer sufferers of how you can carry on without fear of embarrassment or indignity. In 1936 Mitchell was again diagnosed to have cancer and in February 1937 went into a London hospital but was home soon afterwards. Mitchell had to give up work, but watched the very first Spitfire test flights at Eastleigh airfield from his car when he should have been at home resting. This first prototype painted light blue was constructed to a Defence specification which demanded a top speed of 350 mph. in the event the air frame proved itself capable of nearly twice that and was still in active service with certain air forces as late as 1963! Reg passed away on June 7th 1937.His legacy was to have transformed the airplane in a few short years and to have also laid the foundations to equip the RAF with airpower to defeat the Luftwaffe.

Royal Wolverhampton School Lodge No. 8170

The Worshipful Master of the Royal School Lodge No.8170 presented a £1000 cheque to Mark Heywood, the Royal School's Principal, to support the school's "Foundation of Children". The school was originally founded in 1850 as the Wolverhampton Orphan Asylum at 46 Oueen Street by John Lees, a local lock manufacturer and freemason following a cholera epidemic which ravaged the town leaving many children as orphans. In 1854 the school moved to new buildings on the Penn Road which have been greatly extended over the years as they are at present. There was a name change in 1891 when Queen Victoria gave permission for the prefix "Royal" to be used which created the Royal Orphanage of Wolverhampton and remained as such until 1944 when King George VI permitted it to be re-styled and named as The Royal Wolverhampton School. The school's present Royal Patron is Prince Edward the youngest son of The Queen who succeeded his Grandmother, Queen Elizabeth, The Queen Mother. Several well- known faces have attended the school over the years including the English Journalist and TV, Personality, Gilbert Harding and Eric Idle of Monty Python and "Always Look on the Bright Side of Life" song fame. Yet another change came about in September 2016 when the Governors were committed to The Royal School, Wolverhampton opening as a Free School with a capacity over time to provide for 1454 pupils.

The Order of Women Freemasons

Whilst women's Freemasonry is considered by some to be a taboo subject, Freemasonry Today (FMT) published, in Issue 44 ~ Winter 2018, an article entitled 'Women's RITEs'. This was a very interesting article with details of an interview with the Grand Master of the Honourable Fraternity of Ancient Freemasons (HFAF), Christine Chapman.

Christine Chapman explained women's the origins of Freemasonry, including not only HFAF but also the Honourable Fraternity of Antient Masonry (HFAM) which later added 'The Order of Women Freemasons' (OWF) to their title in 1958, and is the name they are known by today.

The United Grand Lodge of England has previously issued a statement acknowledging the regularity and sincerity of women's Freemasonry, but does not formally recognise it. However they have an informal, cordial and co-operative working relationship on such matters as the Universities Scheme and the recent Gender Reassignment Policy.

In November 2018 HFAF gave a presentation at Dalecote House, Coventry in the Province of Warwickshire which was open to all and they continue to hold a number of such events in the Province of Middlesex. but they acknowledge that the OWF is the larger of the two organisations and have many more lodges in the Midlands area.

Why I Became a Freemason

I attended St Georges College in Zimbabwe, where the Jesuits who ran the school instilled in us a sense of humility and the need to live a purposeful life and to serve others. 'Men for others' was our mantra and this made a massive impact on me growing up and my moral compass.

I feel I was born to be a mason, because from a young age until now, I have always strived to use what I know or from my gains in life to help and uplift those less fortunate than myself. Having grown up poor, living in the 'Ghetto' for the first six years of my childhood before being blessed and moving on to a more affluent and comfortable life. I have learnt the hard way to appreciate and value different people from all walks of life, humility and determination have driven me to where I am today.

I am now an accountant by profession which allows me to help others, I also run supported accommodation for people with Mental illness who are being discharged from hospital back into the community. I have a charitable and compassionate heart and thrive when I am helping and giving back to others.



I arrived in the UK some 23 years ago and became friends with Patrick, we have remained close friends ever since despite him living some distance away.

Patrick was a mason and so was his father but within the Irish constitution. I observed Patrick's demeanour, personality, kindness and charitable nature.

It was obvious to me that masonary was a fraternity which promoted all such elements or my best friend would not be a part of it. So naturally I felt comfortable to join and it gave me a sense of being even closer to my friend and all the good things he was doing for the community through his masonic activities.

However, being a Black African, before I joined masonary, there was a very suspicious and negative attitude towards masonry in general from many of my fellow African and Caribbean friends, due to 'misinformation' and ignorance. I was always told (in their words), "You cannot join because masonry is a rich white man's club and they will not let you in."

I didn't believe such rhetoric because of Patrick's membership and soon found out for myself by joining, that they were all so very, very wrong. I have since made it my mission to educate, influence and increase engagement with the BME community as I feel they are missing out on so much.

Masonry has solidified my belief that a brother is a brother, regardless of their race, age, colour, wealth, religion or profession. The friendship, purpose and meaning of life I have searched for, I have found in masonry.

me back and I started a Law Degree in September 2012 and in 2017 I enrolled on the MA Human Resource Management and Employment Law programme at Staffordshire University.

It was at the freshers' fair in September 2017 that my attention was drawn to a new stand, which I heard appeared to be about Freemasonry and students. I was curious. I had previously heard of Freemasonry and was aware of all the charitable work but it had never crossed my mind to find out more. However, together with Royce my guide dog, I made my way through the crowd and spoke with Andy Mapperson and Josh Holford. I decided to conduct my own research and find out more.

I had become friends with Louis Martin, my lecturer and personal tutor. He was quite surprised and impressed by the fact I had such an effective memory and was able to remember various aspects of the law and recall it verbally. I had been required to memorise a number of Acts and Sections of law during my undergraduate studies.

I cannot read Braille and many of my assessments included verbally recounting my research. It was during one of our many conversations that we spoke about Freemasonry. Louis explained to me that it was about camaraderie, making a man better by study and friendship and that I would enjoy the social scene taking part in charitable events.

I was introduced to his mentor and inspiration in Freemasonry, Peter Hughes. I met with Peter, who is the secretary of the Universities Lodge of Staffordshire No. 9907, at Shelton. He was very friendly and told me that my disability would have no effect on my entry into Freemasonry and that Freemasons were all about helping people.

Peter told me that Freemasonry would enable me to develop all my skills, meet people, and be part of a team. Everyone I met at ULS was so kind and friendly, they all had a great sense of humour. I really enjoyed the banter and so I joined.

That's basically how I became involved in Freemasonry. I receive lots of encouragement, praise and positive feedback when I perform ritual, including the working tools and charge after initiation. I would really like to progress and take a key role in my Lodge. I strongly recommend to anyone with a disability to find out more about Freemasonry and consider joining.

'Rose Croix – The Ancient and Accepted Rite of England Wales and its Districts Overseas'

Whilst we all acknowledge the first three degrees of Freemasonry as being the foundation of our Masonic journey, for many the Order of Rose Croix holds 'something special'.

Those who would seek more light, more knowledge of the mission and symbolism of Freemasonry, a more complete interpretation of the teachings of the Craft degrees, as well as acceptance into a very special fellowship and Brotherhood, will find these aspects within the Ancient and Accepted Rite.

Known in some parts as the Scottish Rite, the Ancient and Accepted Rite follows the Christian teachings and does require that candidates profess the Trinitarian Christian Faith, as well as having been a Master Mason for at least one full year.

Established in 1801, the Order comprises 33 Degrees, which amplify the teachings of Craft Masonry, within a Christian context. The ceremony of the 18th Degree; the only ceremony worked in full by a Chapter, is immensely thought provoking, impressive and colourful which instils a warmth of Brotherly Love on which the whole Masonic Order is based.

Regalia for the 18th Degree is both simple and spectacular, at the same time, comprising a red coloured collar, edged with gold braid and a deal of symbolism. A jewel is appended to the collar.

Working through the several offices of the Chapter, the position of Chair is that of Most Wise Sovereign, who having successfully completed his year may be considered for promotion to the 30th Degree. The promotion to the 30th Degree is held at Supreme Council Offices at Duke Street, St James's in London, governed over by the nine members of Supreme Council.

All Inspectors General are 33rd Degree members and are delegated their powers within Districts by Supreme Council.

An Inspector General is supported within his District by a District Recorder, who is responsible for the District's administration and who is a vital link between the District and Supreme Council in London.

The District of Staffordshire & Shropshire comprises 20 Chapters, making it one of the larger Districts in the England and Wales. As at 30th June 2018 we have just over 450 members.

Chapters usually meet three times per year and a marked difference of the Rose Croix ceremonies are that no members are asked to withdraw for any parts and the ceremonies could best be described as 'engaging and inclusive of all'.

Talk to many long serving and eminent Masons and they will explain that the Rose Croix Degree has 'something special' and is a very treasured Order by its members.

I have proudly been the Inspector General for the District of Staffordshire & Shropshire since 2015, ably supported by our District Recorder, Ill. Bro. Maurice Williams 31° and we would both be pleased to provide more information on our Order to anyone who wishes to find out more about that 'something special'.
